Ohepatitis ACT

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Hepatitis ACT refines its model of health education based on participant's engagement and understanding.

Viral hepatitis affects almost 500,000 Australians. In 2016, 32% of Canberra's population was overseas-born. International students, skilled workers and dependents with temporary visa status also constitute the multicultural population. The focus of this presentation is on the inclusion and support of health services in the context of viral hepatitis for Canberra's Culturally and Linguistically Diverse communities.


Owing to the stigma surrounding hepatitis in most communities, a session termed "Liver health education" gathers more momentum.

Cultural understanding, and appropriateness are key from the start to the finish of each session.





A traffic lights game is used at the session, which involves audience participation in deciding what is good and bad for the liver. A further discussion on the topic builds excellent rapport with the clients.



This evolves into discussions about the viral forms of hepatitis (A-E), with the use of pictorials, liver models and global prevalence maps.



Cancer is a subject that is often an eye opener, so the last section involves the explanation of progression of liver damage into liver cancer.



Language support is pivotal. Hepatitis ACT provides information about hepatitis in 40+ languages, gathers feedback through evaluation forms in multiple languages and provides factsheets that advise people where to get tested in the ACT region.
