Finding your way around the virtual program

Last year's COVID restrictions led us to pioneer a virtual platform for our joint conferences. At the time we thought it would be a one-off, but here we are again all joining in from our homes and offices. The good news is that we have a few tricks up our sleeve that we learnt from last year, to help make your remote conference experience rewarding and engaging.

You should have by now received your login for the virtual event portal (if you have not, or you're having trouble accessing the portal, please contact conference@ashm.org.au or +61 2 8204 0770). We've also made a short video to show you how the event portal works – [watch it here](#).

The conference program has two formats — the [LIVE program](#) features a schedule of keynotes, plenaries and panel discussions taking place throughout the week, while the [ON-DEMAND oral](#) and [poster programs](#) are available to you at any time.

You'll also be able to visit exhibitors by clicking on the "Meet with Exhibitors" tab to the right of the portal when you login.

We've also got some great **prizes** up for grabs. Session highlights for Monday - Focus on Sexual Health

Plenary – Sexual Literacy

At this morning's plenary session we'll hear from international keynote

speaker **Professor Jessica Fields**, speaking about Sexual Literacy.

Professor Fields will explore complex topics in sexual and reproductive health, including teenage pregnancy, gender-based violence, respectful relationships, love, desire and pleasure.

Professor Fields will also co-chair a **4:00pm** session under the Social, Political & Cultural Aspects theme to explore what sexual literacy means, how it can be measured, the role of porn in creating it and how we can promote sexual literacy among adults through sex and relationships therapy. Queer trans advocate **Emery Wishart** will also look at trans youth perspectives on sexual literacy.

Morning session highlights

In the **11:30am** Epidemiology, Prevention and Health Promotion session, we will learn about STIs in different population groups, from female sex workers in Melbourne and Sydney to infectious syphilis trends and risk factors among women and heterosexual men.

We'll also hear about the ethnic disparities in PrEP experiences among gay and bisexual men in Auckland, as well as trends in sexual practices and STI positivity among lesbian, bisexual and heterosexual women.

Adolescent access and experience of abortion care in NSW is one of the topics being covered in this morning's Social, Political and Social Aspects theme, along with an exploration of young people and unwanted sexual events, and the sexual and reproductive health rights of young people with intellectual disability.

Make sure not to miss the **2:00pm** Abstract Spotlight Session, featuring a paper from **Cat Kirby** from Family Planning Victoria on The role of telehealth in abortion and contraception care.
