Due to all the student's diverse personalities and disabilities, collapsing the classes for this type of delivery has been challenging and also rewarding to watch students thrive and flourish.

The research is clear, the statistics alarming, we are not preparing our students for a future that has not yet been created. They are not developing the skills deemed essential for the new and ever adapting world. Communication, Creativity, Collaboration, Critical Thinking, the 4 C's that underpin the entirety of the pedagogical approach. The skills fostered through the development of clear protocols and standards for content delivery within the PBL framework. Students are given the independence and responsibility for their own learning, with the guidance of staff.
