 - Donated bike redistribution
 - Events and activations
- Typically operated from 2-3 shipping containers
- Open 16 20 hours a week



- Key is to bridge the gap between local responsiveness and strong governance and consistency





A need for an integrated network

- We provide bus stops & transport hubs, ferry terminals and train stations, but what do we do for bikes?
- A lot... but programmes are unseen and delivered via commercial models
- Behaviour change works best when it comes from your neighbours







So what if we could expand Bike Hubs...

and make them the heart of all things bike in a community?

Guided by

- For community, by community. Trusted local partners with local govt backing
- A strong, consistent model region-wide with local vibes
- Creating a sense of place and community, beyond just fixing bikes
- Providing a free one-stop shop for all your bike questions
- Delivering a new transport infrastructure akin train stations or ferry terminals
- Targeting 50,000 visitors per year (that's over 3% of Auckland!), with
 - 15,000 bikes fixed
 - 5,000 bikes redistributed










