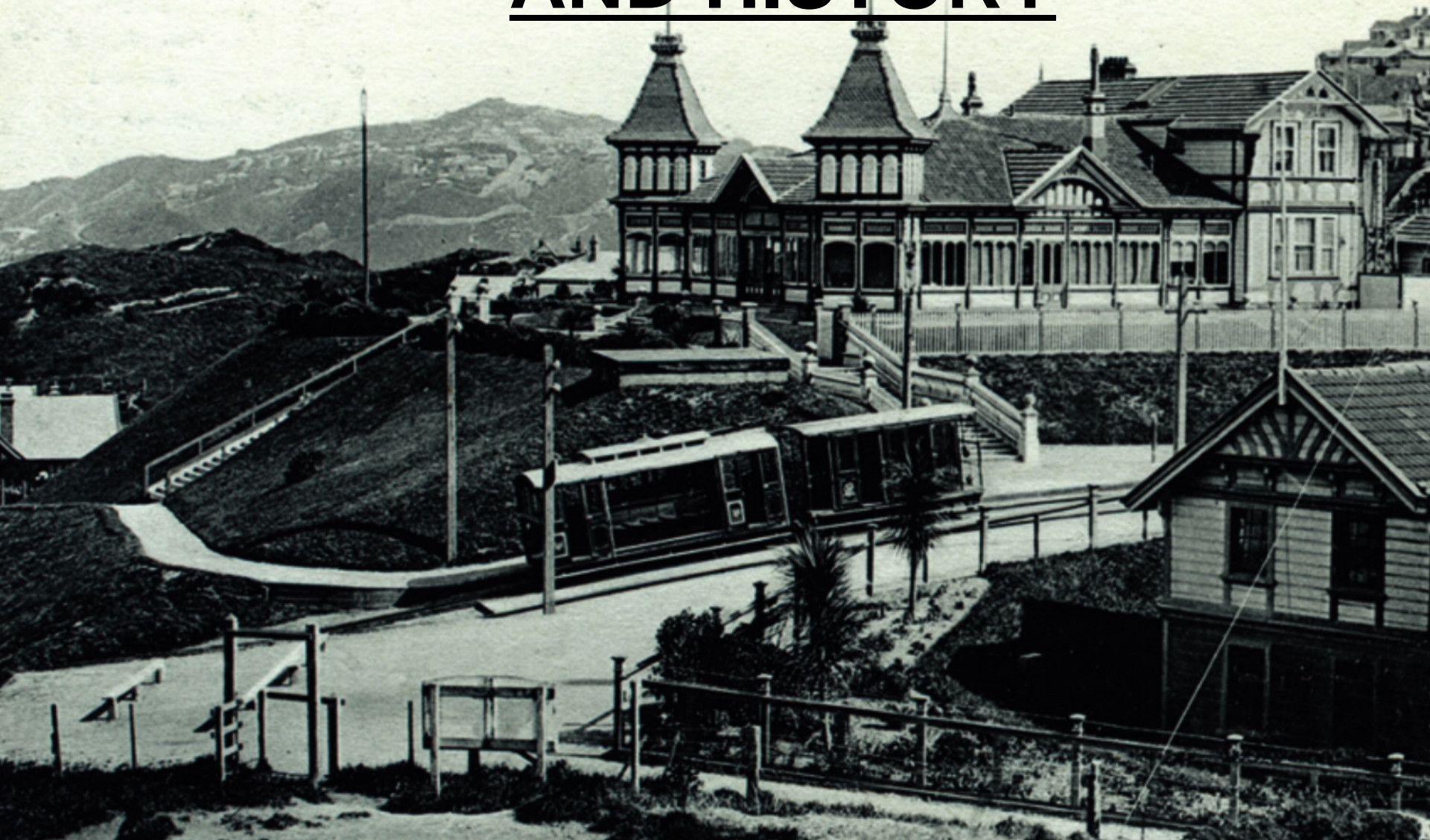

WELLINGTON CABLE CAR

is recognised as an engineering achievement of outstanding heritage significance by the Institution of Professional Engineers New Zealand.

Opened in 1902 as a combined cable tramway and funicular, the Cable Car is one of the best-known works of prominent engineer James Fulton (1854–1928). Although it has been extensively modernised, it still uses the original tunnels and formation. Residents and Victoria University of Wellington students use it daily and it is a popular tourist attraction.

Added to IPENZ's Engineering Heritage Register in 2012. Plaque unveiled 2015.
