



Waikato Speed Management Working Group

- Lay the groundwork, start the conversation, listen
- Use a range of channels and voices, keep talking
- Tell the story, share statistics, ditch the jargon
- It takes resource and time







Safer speeds for your road



There's been a high number of crashes on State Highway 1 between Taupō Airport and Motuoapa and locals have told us that speeds on the road feel too high to be safe. We want to make sure that speeds are safe and right for this road, so we're reviewing the current speed limits.

Speed increases both the likelihood of crashes and the severity of crashes when they happen. A small reduction in speed can make a big difference, especially when cyclists or pedestrians are involved. Most crashes are caused by a number of factors, but even when it's not the cause of a crash, speed is most likely to determine whether anyone is killed, injured, or walks away unharmed.

Speed review process

We'll use the feedback we get during engagement to recommend what speed limits are best for these roads and then formally consult with you. The stages of the speed review process are:

SPEED REVIEW STARTS

Technical assessment of the road is carried out to find out about crash history, average vehicle speeds, volume of vehicles and development of surrounding areas. This helps to determine what safe and appropriate speeds should be.

ENGAGEMENT

We talk to local communities and stakeholders to understand how the road is being used, any safety concerns and get feedback on speed limits.

FORMAL CONSULTATION

Changing a speed limit is a legal process, so this stage involves sharing a detailed proposal with people and asking for any additional information that might have an impact on the final decision.

We're also going to be out and about talking with you, and have a display and maps for you to give feedback at Gle and Hillcrest libraries.




Reasons for proposed changes

We have received feedback from the community that they would like the northern end of Kinloch Rd to be a more pedestrianfriendly area. There will also be increased traffic and surrounding activity from a number of new subdivisions being developed.

Cost and time impact

There will be a moderate time impact, with a trip along the road taking up to 25 seconds longer. The implementation costs will be around \$15,000 to \$20,000 for relocation of speed signs and road marking. This will be funded from the existing budgets for minor road safety works, and new signs and markings.

^{*85%} of vehicles travel at or below this speed





1. Speed review starts

A technical assessment of the road is carried out to find out information like crash history, average speed vehicles are travelling on the road, number of vehicles a day using the road, what is happening around the road (changes in housing, urban development, businesses etc) and other activity on the road. This helps to determine what a safe and appropriate speed for the road should be – and if it is out of step with current speed limits.

2. Engagement

Conversations with local communities, councils, road user representative groups and other stakeholders - to get feedback and local knowledge on how people are using the road, concerns, and things to be aware that could help inform the review. This helps when deciding if lowering the speed limit is the best thing to do to improve road safety, where new speed limits might begin and end, and if any other safety improvements (signage etc) might be needed.

3. Formal consultation

Changing a speed limit is a legal process, so this step is when we show people a detailed proposed speed limit, which has been developed using the technical assessment and feedback from the engagement stage. During this consultation stage, we ask the public and stakeholders for any additional information that might have an impact on the final decision.

4. Notification of speed limit change

Once a decision is made based on the submissions from the consultation stage, it is published on our website and an update is sent to anyone who wants to know the decision.

5. New speed limit on the road

People can expect to see new speed limit signs on the road.



4. SPEED MANAGEMENT PRINCIPLES

The following principles will guide the application of speed management within Hamilton:

- . The speed environment around schools at school times the start and end of the school day will be 30km/h
- Where there are high numbers of people walking, biking and crossing the road the speed environment will be 30km/h
- Residential local roads will be constructed for a 40km/h environment
- · New roads will be constructed appropriate to the function and to create a safe and appropriate environment
- · Existing roads may be upgraded appropriate to the function and to create a safe and appropriate environment
- · A logical, area-based approach will be used for the implementation of speed management
- · Investment will be targeted to achieve the best access and safety outcomes
- . We will work with partnering RCAs to provide a consistent approach in line with the Speed Management Guide

5. SPEED MANAGEMENT PRIORITIES

We need to be able to prioritise our work. The following priorities will guide us in our approach to implementing speed management:

- · High benefit routes which deliver maximum benefit in reducing deaths and serious injuries
- · Places where there is strong community demand for change
- Supporting changes in neighbouring areas to achieve consistent and logical implementation
- · Places where lots of people walk or bike, or where they will soon walk and bike




Final words of advice
