

Encourages designs that cater for the whole community


Attracts positive uses



HOW do we go about integrating CPTED?




7 qualities of well designed, safer spaces





Concept Design:

- Do we understand the context?
- Have you spoken to key stakeholders?
- Where are people coming to and from (desire lines)?
- Spatial allocation how much space should be given to different users and uses?
- What supervision strategies are in place? How can we encourage more users?





Detailed Design:


- What materials are proposed? Are they 'target hardened'?
- Does the design enable local placemaking?
- How will the different spaces feel?
- How have blank facades been addressed?
- Will the lighting strategy provide an appropriate nighttime environment?
