

2046 City Centre Mode Share




Active Vehicles LRT Bus Ferry Rail

- NZICC, Commercial Bay, etc. construction underway
- Accelerated city centre growth
- AT also has better forecasting models for travel demands



Tiger team



- A small core working team made up of reps from each CCO – interrogated issues project by project but quickly identified lack of co-ordinated governance
- A **PCG** was established, made up of manager from each CCO knowledgeable about the city centre, to co-ordinate workstreams
- An equivalent **ESG**, made up of senior managers with decision-making authority, was also established to approve or make decisions on projects ahead of them being taken to the public or elected representatives
- Expectation that issues were to be resolved before they reached the ESG




Tiger team



- Sought to maintain the vision and direction of Council plans, as well as deliver on AT's strategic requirements.
- Free and frank discussions, which challenged the thinking and assumptions of all participants, was central to the progress made
- AT brought to the discussion an understanding of peoplemoving requirements, whilst Council reps brought aspirations for people-centred urban spaces
- The challenge was to **collaboratively merge** these elements



































"Two Great Streets"



- There can only be combined winners
- If you 'win' and they 'lose', you don't get to do your project, because stakeholders will object, so you haven't won at all





• Free and frank discussions of a core group can get to the real issues, challenge existing assumptions and seek 'best for city centre' solutions





• Developing simple high quality visuals to 'sell' the story with stakeholders is critical. A good plan on its own isn't enough





• For transport professionals in a city centre, realise that you must not only bring people in, but also provide a quality urban realm (and conversely for urban designers, a beautiful urban environment noone can get to is pointless)





- Carefully work agreements up through layers of technical staff, senior staff, managers, and politicians
- Avoid keeping transport discussions solely within the transport sector/department
