Road trauma and Māori

- Māori living in Auckland, Waikato, Bay of Plenty, Te Tai Tokerau – Northland and Tairāwhiti – Gisborne
- 2. Late night weekend driving
- 3. Younger Māori men more at risk
- 4. Less fully licensed drivers
- More incidents where people weren't wearing a restraint
- 6. More incidents of driving while impaired
- 7. Loss of control on bend crashes
- 8. Less safe vehicles with higher occupant numbers
- 9. More incidents where speed is a key factor


