It's important to know that our emotions and feelings are still valid, and we still have a voice and that we can also help create a vision towards a brighter future.

I believe it's so important that students should contribute towards the conference and, the students just being there, it's really evidence of how these programs at schools really do bring out those 21<sup>st</sup> century skills. It's definitely working.

So I think it's crucial to be involved in these conferences, to understand the why and the how of these global futures and global competencies, and empower my colleagues back at work and back at school.
