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


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# The Majority of Asia-Pacific's People are Unprotected

# **Key Progress and Trends**



#### Governments are making progress towards more inclusive social protection systems

See some examples of:

- Extension of coverage
- Some expansion of contributory schemes
- Innovations to identify and enroll furthest behind groups
- Digital social protection systems and payment systems expanding reach to groups in vulnerable situations

#### Critical barriers and challenges persist

- Both for contributory and non-contributory schemes
- Effective coverage lags behind legal coverage
- Weak enforcement and implementation of policies
- Lack of coordination and fragmentation
- Insufficient financing low levels of social protection expenditure
- Exclusionary patterns persist
- Gender
- Persons with disability
- Migrant workers



# Intergovernmental and Regional Commitments



Key international and regional frameworks have recognized the importance of social protection as a core building block to build resilience of persons in vulnerable situations.





The Declaration on the Asian and Pacific Decade of Persons with Disabilities (2023–2032) calls on governments to "extend both mainstream and disability-specific social protection schemes to cover young children, adolescents, women and older persons with disabilities".



The "Fourth Regional Review and appraisal of the Madrid International Plan of Action on Ageing" (2022) emphasizes dignity and autonomy of older persons and need to develop an inclusive, adaptive and rights-based approach to social protection systems as well as access to health services.



The "Regional Review of Implementation of the Global Compact for Safe, Orderly and Regular Migration" (2021) highlights the need to provide adequate support to migrants through social protection and apply the principle of equality of treatment (between nationals and migrants).



The Asia-Pacific Declaration on Advancing Gender Equality and Women's Empowerment: Beijing+30 is likley to place greater emphasis on the caresensitive policy framework that emphasizes the need for care-related social protection, care services, and employment-related care policies. This focus on care work will also need to be central to developing more gender-responsive social protection systems.

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
