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Richard Highfield is a consultant in tax system design and administration and holds a Bachelor of Commerce degree (Accounting Major) from the University of New South Wales (UNSW) and an honorary position of Adjunct Professor with the UNSW School of Business. His professional career included L2 years (2003-2015) as a division head and senior advisor with the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD) in Paris, 6 years (1997-2003) as a senior advisor with the International Monetary Fund (IMF) and over 25 years with the Australian Taxation Office where he was a Second Commissioner of Taxation from 1993-1997.

Since leaving the OECD, Richard's work has included tax administration-related assignments with the World Bank (Indonesia), the Asian Development Bank (ADB), research assignments with UNSW, and the Australian Taxation Office's tax gap research program. His specific fields of expertise include comparative analysis of tax system design, administration, and performance; tax gap research methodologies and analysis; compliance costs research and analysis. His ADB assignments have included: 1) the development of ADB's comparative series on tax administration (Editions 2 to 6); 2) comparative research of selected ADB members' tax systems to identify opportunities for enhanced domestic resource mobilization efforts; and 3) collaborating with the OECD in the development of VAT toolkits to support Asian and Pacific economies in the application of VAT to digital trade.
