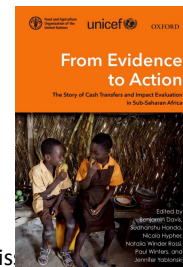

Compared with Africa, there is limited research and evidence generate in Asia and Pacific

Evidence-Based Policy

To make well informed **decisions** about policies, programmes and projects by putting the best **available evidence** from research at the heart of policy development and implementation

In the era of **Artificial Intelligence** (AI) and Machine Learning, the capacity to generate **questions** asked by humans matter more than the capacity to generate **answers** provided by ChatGPT.

Policy – B(i)ased - Evidence

Relies heavily on either the selective use of evidence (e.g. on single studies irrespective of quality) or on the untested views of individuals or groups, often inspired by ideological standpoints, prejudices, or speculative conjecture.

Cash will be wasted on alcohol and tobacco

1-2%
Alcohol and tobacco represent 1-2% of food expenditures

Across 6 countries, no evidence of increased expenditure on alcohol and tobacco

In Lesotho, alcohol expenditure actually decreased

Transfers lead to price inflation and disrupt local economy

No inflation detected in 6 case study countries

Why not?

- Beneficiaries are a small share of community, typically 15-20%
- They come from poorest households, with low purchasing power and thus don't buy enough to affect market prices
- Local economies can meet the increased demand

In Ethiopia, for every dollar transferred by the programme, about \$1.50 was generated for the local economy

Child-focused grants increase fertility rate

In Zambia, cash transfers showed no impact on fertility

-34% Early pregnancy reduced by 34% in Kenya, 10.5% points in South Africa

-10.5% points

From Knowledge to Action: Building Policy Impact

□ We need policy skills

Policy skills are not about the kind of in-depth knowledge of a subject area that typifies the lifetime of an academic.

Policy skills are about being able to absorb relevant high-level information quickly, make informed judgements and advise policy-makers on the most effective way to implement public commitments made to voters.

□ We need to invest in evidence policy impact

- How much **time and money** you invest in **research**?
- How much in the **policy process**?

Understand and focus on policy makers:

- ✓ Different environment
- ✓ Different language
- ✓ Different priorities

The Research process is part of the solution:

- ✓ Build Relationships
- ✓ Share ownerships
- ✓ Document

The focus of **decision-making** is **shifting** from data, numbers, and facts **to generate knowledge**



the importance of **nurturing human skills** that complement these new capabilities



Humans bring **critical thinking, creativity, and empathy** to the table



Investing in research and evidence generation becomes vital to equip individuals with the necessary **skills**

Cutting edge of Social Protection Research

- Going beyond indicators (they don't explain)
- Going beyond the impact evaluation design
- RCT not always possible (Money Ethics)
- Different methods of quasi experimental design (propensity score matching, regression discontinuity design etc)
- AI as a great opportunity to improve efficiency and effectiveness, if well used
- Focus on the change generated by knowledge
