 Session 7: HIGH RISK FOOT VS LIMB – Are we assessing and treating the full problem? Auditorium How do you assess the lower limb? How much do you rely on 'test results? Does the presence of a foot pulse indicate adequate blood supply to heal a wound? Are we conducting correct assessment techniques and are we consistent? How subjective is our interpretation of test results and what can we do better?
