Session 2: INVESTIGATIONS - The art and science of diagnosing

As advanced wound clinicians, we know that one of the most important aspects of wound management is an accurate diagnosis that will quide our treatment. But how do we diagnose? Are we using the right tools? Do we really know how to interpret the results?

We will challenge the way we assess and diagnose our clients through questioning:

- How do you take a biopsy that yields the best results and where do you take it from? Better to take one specimen or multiple?
- Which bloods should we be ordering to detect auto immune disorders? Inflammatory disorders? Nutritional deficits?
- What do our pathology and histopathology results really tell us?
- What's the difference between a poorly differentiated SCC and a well differentiated SCC? Why does it matter?
- Detecting osteomyelitis: Should we do plain x-ray first then follow up with Bone scan/MRI or are we wasting our time on x-ray?
- Can you have normal bedside vascular results (ABPI, TPI) in the presence of occlusion?

Session 3: OEDEMA - Is it all fluid?

Sure we need them, but do you ever think about what is actually happening under the skin, what is really causing the oedema, the effect this has on lymphatics, blood vessels and the tissue? - What about end of life oedema?

Session 7: HIGH RISK FOOT VS LIMB – Are we assessing and treating the full problem?

Auditorium

How do you assess the lower limb? How much do you rely on 'test results? Does the presence of a foot pulse indicate adequate blood supply to heal a wound? Are we conducting correct assessment techniques and are we consistent? How subjective is our interpretation of test results and what can we do better?

In this session we will discuss current guidelines and assessment practices to challenge the way we assess and diagnose our clients. Consider:

- ABI and TP are within normal limits: does this mean arterial supply is ok?
- How do you know which vessel you are studying?
- When we talk about small blood vessels and their growth, how long does this process take? Does oedema influence small vessel growth?
- Procedural intervention for venous insufficiency is becoming more common why and are the outcomes long lasting?
- Is there such as thing as a straight forward venous leg ulcer?
- Is the monofilament a true assessment of peripheral diabetes neuropathy?
- Does foot structure and mechanics impact wound healing of the foot and lower limb?

Session 8: PRESSURE INJURY / INCONTINENCE ACQUIRED DERMATITIS – Why is it so difficult? Auditorium

If a large percentage of pressure injuries are preventable, why are they still happening? How does IAD affect the skin and why is this still often mistaken for a pressure injury?

In this session we will talk to leaders in the field of pressure injury and IAD to find out what is really happening at the skin surface and in the tissues beneath, and what are we missing?

- Should we have an unavoidable pressure injury classification?
- Does Kennedy Ulcer classification fit within the models we currently have, and should this be adopted? How does it differ from a deep tissue pressure injury?
- How can we teach pressure injury prevention better to get the message across?
- How can we make it easier to choose the right support surface?
- How do we manage IAD and reduce risk?
- Is classifying IAD straight forward or is there something more?

Session 9: ETHICS, EVIDENCE, INDUSTRY - translating this to the real world.

High quality wound care is performed by health professionals within the context of evidence-based practice and an ethical practice framework.

Contemporary healthcare must be delivered within the bounds of legislation, regulation, codes of conduct and local policies. How do we navigate this landscape to bring evidence-based practice to our patients? What role does industry play in bringing care options to people with a wound? In this session we will discuss standards of practice and delivering ethical, evidence-based wound practice in contemporary wound practice settings. Consider:

- What are the responsibilities of wound professionals in delivering evidence-based care?
- What moral and ethical dilemmas have you faced, and how did you overcome the challenges?
- What are the links between research and professional integrity?
- What constitutes consent and what are our legal obligations?
- Do ethical concerns influence the uptake of opportunities to be involved in industry-driven research?
- What are some of the challenges of bringing new wound products into Australia?
- What makes a conflict of interest or ethical dilemma? As professionals, how do we interact with industry? Can we talk with industry representatives or accept sponsorships?
- Should we consider the environmental impact of wound products? Is this an area that industry is addressing?
