### **Concurrent Session: 1.1A**

**Workshop Title:** Te Ara Whakapuāwai – The pathway to flourishing. A conceptual approach to educating for wellbeing.

We know our teachers are busy, so we set out to make planning and educating for wellbeing easier – by providing learning modules full of activities that can be engaged with face-to-face or online, guided by teachers or accessed independently by kids.

We now have a bespoke whole school wellbeing course, structured around the ten key concepts of Identity, Diversity, Citizenship, Guardianship, Leadership, Connection, Wellbeing, Flourishing, Relationships and Care.

It's a win-win solution which ensures we have national consistency in our delivery of wellbeing education, and our learning community have the flexibility to utilise these learning activities in the way that works for them.

**Workshop Title:** Queensland's Largest Classroom

By working together in clever and creative ways, the Western Alliance (the three Western Queensland Schools of Distance Education - Mount Isa, Longreach and Charleville) provides its year 7- 10 students a quality teaching and learning program, offering students:

- ❖ more direct teaching of curriculum through increased on-air time
- ❖ individualised support and tutorials
- ❖ Home groups / Go2 groups (with a Go2 teacher)
- ❖ a variety of elective subjects including vocational training
- ❖ access to teachers with subject expertise and
- ❖ engagement with peers through on-air lessons, and face to face during field services.

**Workshop Title:** Linking to learn - using relational connection to drive educational outcomes in distance settings

Establishing effective differentiation strategies for students with learning barriers during synchronous online lessons requires a comprehensive school-wide approach. This workshop will bring together Universal Design for Learning (UDL) strategies, relational pedagogy, and some suggestions and examples of leading your school through change. Discuss innovative, practical approaches to increase student engagement by encouraging a classroom environment where students will seek and accept feedback by knowing each student and promoting student agency and voice. Using the theory of Novak's "UDL Now!" and Gordon, Meyer, and Rose's "Universal Design for Learning", the group will scan and assess our ability to create differentiated, inclusive, and student-centred learning environments.

**Workshop Title:** Enhancing Student Support in Remote Learning: Implementing the TAL Model

This workshop aims to showcase the school's implementation of a comprehensive site-wide process to address the diverse needs of our student body. In this workshop, we'll emphasise the importance of identifying and integrating best practices specifically tailored for remote learning settings. Through the adoption of the Team Around the Learner (TAL) model, we've established an approach that enables stakeholders to raise concerns, which allows wellbeing leaders to promptly assess and address these concerns through early intervention and escalation protocols. By embracing the TAL process, we effectively respond to student disengagement, offer flexible learning pathways, connect them with allied health experts, and ensure stakeholders' voices are acknowledged and valued.

**Workshop Title:** Why it's worth reinventing the wheel: How to create impactful educational videos

Educational multimedia creation is one of the most resource-intensive endeavours a classroom teacher can embark on, however, quality educational videos in a distance learning context can have high impact on student learning. How can distance educators balance resources of time, effort, and professional development to maximise student learning in their online classrooms? This workshop will: outline the strengths and weaknesses of teacher creation of educational videos, summarise the most recent literature on effective educational video production, use a real-world case study for participant brainstorming, and provide participants guidance in planning their next educational video in their online class.

**Workshop Title:** Interactivity, Student Accountability and Evidence Gathering

Unpacking two programs (NearPod and Wordwall) that give real-time insights into student understanding through interactive lessons and assessments. These programs allow teachers to keep their students on task and accountable during online lessons as well as acting as a tool to gather evidence of student progress and achievement.

This workshop will demonstrate how these two programs can be used independently or in conjunction to enhance your LMS with practical examples, focusing on interactive elements that promote student engagement and accountability.

**Workshop Title:** Te Aka Taumatua - indigenising learning online and at distance in Aotearoa

Te Aho o Te Kura Pounamu has undergone transformational growth towards embracing change and building connections with Māori. Hear the journey undertaken by staff in this organisation as Māori ways of being, doing and knowing are embedded in all areas of delivery. Explore how an organisation shifted from simple acknowledgements and greetings to establishing provision for bilingual and immersion education. Come along and unpack through discussions the small nudges that made for the greatest impact.

Te Aka Taumatua means the main vine system - this system nurtures aspirations and innovations, and inspires future generations to step into their uniqueness.

**Workshop Title:** Implementing Quality Assessment Rounds

Quality Assessment build on the Quality Teaching Model's three dimensions of evidence-informed good teaching and assessment practice: Intellectual quality, Quality learning environment, and Significance. Through the use of Quality Assessment, teachers are able to structure planning, reflection and analysis to build capacity in the development of quality assessment practices.

The session will provide participants an opportunity to participate in a sample Quality Assessment Round. Using the QA guide participants will examine how each element of the Model can be used to analyse an assessment task(s).

**Workshop Title:** Setting high expectations through School Core Values

Our student context has changed over the last few years; our students have become more disengaged and socially isolated. We noticed that our students needed some positive modelling in digital etiquette and online relationships. The Core Values course looks at Respect, Responsibility and Communication. This course is interactive and delivered alongside our Induction Course, during the students first week of enrolment. At the end of this course, students sign off on a Learning Contract which supports their commitment and connection to learning via Distance Education.

The delivery of these two courses underpins our school wellbeing strategies and focus.

**Workshop Title:** Korimako Online - Building connections through interest-based learning

We know a sense of belonging is key for students to flourish in a learning environment. For us to foster a community of learners who share, collaborate, and lead in a safe space, we have developed a course of interest-based online classes for our Year 0-10 students, combining synchronous and asynchronous learning.

Student 'voice' and 'choice' are key elements with these optional classes being crafted and adjusted in response to the interests of students. Content and delivery is differentiated to allow students of all ages and abilities to work together, strengthening their sense of connection and belonging.

**Workshop Title:** Building Better Readers: A Community-wide Approach to Enhancing Fluency for All

Of the Big 6 of reading, fluency is among the most challenging to address online. Unlike face-to-face schools, where reading can be monitored daily, our setting offers limited time with young readers. To address this challenge, SOTA staff have worked with OAC's speech pathologist to design an innovative whole-school Daily Oral Reading Fluency (DORF) program for distance education.

In our workshop, participants will experience the DORF cycle, before learning about the development process and how we have used our context's structure and learning environment to engage and develop students and the school community's commitment to reading.

**Workshop Title:** Connect Week Unveiled: A Case Study from Virtual School Victoria
