Monash University: from Plan to Place

Monash University adopted its first contemporary masterplans in 2010. Since then, its campuses at Caulfield and Clayton have transformed from aggregated hubs into cohesive, world-leading centres for learning, teaching, research, innovation and enterprise. Jocelyn has been on that journey since inception, first as a consultant working on these plans, to the person responsible for implementing them. Her talk will take attendees on a whirlwind tour of institutional change and curation, and examples of the ground-breaking environments that have emerged as a result.

Outcomes include: masterplanning principles, effecting cultural change, masterplan enablers, the importance of curation and design oversight, consultant procurement, design advocacy/review/value management, approaches to contemporary landscape design, integrated public art, intelligent maintenance
