Team Building

"This exercise helps to show us that using the help of your peers is a very valuable tool when it comes to problem solving, or even writing. Using ideas from others can help to create new thoughts using a combination of both minds. Sometimes the solution can't be seen by one but can be seen by another."



Problem Solving




"This exercise taught us that to solve a problem we shouldn't ignore our attempts, because there is no downfall in trying different things."

"Let's just start over with an open mind."

Inquiry

"This exercise taught us exactly what inquiry is, gathering ideas and thoughts in order to evaluate a situation. It also helped me realize that inquiry, writing and research are all tied together. In order to write you need to gather thoughts and ideas which is inquiry. On top of that, sometimes you need to research in order to gather some of those ideas."



Inquiry

"Most of all, this exercise taught me to use every clue that came into my head because why not. The more ideas you have, the better you can dwindle down to a few really good ones."



Fostering the Growth Mindset



"This exercise showed us that it is okay to fail sometimes. It isn't going to be the end of the world. It taught us that exploring new options that didn't lead to success but did lead us to a different path was successful. If one thing didn't work we tried again."

Engaging Students

- Allows more advanced students to take leadership roles
- Introduction to librarians as a resource, and to library resources



Lessons Learned

Game Design

- ★ The hardest part!
- ★ Opportunity for creativity
- ★ Brainstorm with a colleague or course instructor
- ★ Vary level of difficulty to get to solutions
 - Consider a two-step solution
 - Gmail out of office message
- ★ Build in red herrings

Before the Class

- Double check all kits complete and locks correctly set
- Give others a heads up (e.g. Email librarians on chat reference)
- Make sure there is at least one computer for each team


Remove the Chairs



- Encourages students to move around and work together
- Ensures that everyone has access to the clues

Instructors Work in Pairs

- Monitoring teams
- Resetting locks in between sessions
- Librarian and Instructor or 2 Librarians



Give Hints, Not Answers



Good Hints:

- Everything you need is right in front of you. Have you looked closely at all of your clues?
- What kind of solution do you need to open the lock? A 3-digit number? A 5-letter word?
- What resources might you use to find the information you need? (e.g. zombie librarian)
