



David Barboza Co-founder, *The Wire* 

David Barboza is the co-founder of *The Wire*, a news and data platform focused on examining China's economic rise. Previously, he was a longtime business reporter and foreign correspondent at *The New York Times*. In 2013, Barboza was awarded the Pulitzer Prize for international reporting "for his striking exposure of corruption at high levels of the Chinese government, including billions in secret wealth owned by relatives of the prime minister,

well-documented work published in the face of heavy pressure from the Chinese officials." He was also part of the team that won the Pulitzer Prize for explanatory reporting, for his coverage of Apple's operations in China. That same year, he won a George Polk Award for foreign reporting.

Barboza joined *The Times* in 1997 as a staff writer. He covered the stock market, and then served for five years as the Midwest business correspondent based in Chicago. He moved to China in 2004 as a business correspondent, and then, from 2008 to 2015, was the paper's Shanghai bureau chief. In 2016, he was a visiting Nieman Fellow at Harvard University.
