The proposed session will bring together researchers investigating:

- The role of local governments in creating enabling policy frameworks for circular transitions.
- Organizational adaptation and innovation in implementing circular business models.
- Civil society engagement and behavioral change in supporting circular initiatives.
- Cross-sectoral partnerships and governance mechanisms facilitating regional circular economy.
- Metrics and assessment tools for measuring circular progress at the regional scale.

By focusing on these multi-stakeholder dynamics, the session aims to advance our understanding of how regions can leverage circularity to build resilience against external shocks while promoting sustainable economic development. Contributions will combine theoretical frameworks with empirical evidence from diverse geographical contexts, offering insights into both the challenges and opportunities in regional circular transitions during turbulent times.
