ICFP is Much More Than a Conference



A recognized need in the field of sexual and reproductive health and rights (SRHR) for power to be distributed differently

Origins of the group


- In advance of the International Conference on Family Planning (ICFP) in 2022, "a coalition of the willing" representing research, implementation, advocacy, and governments came together
 - to chart a way forward that prioritizes shifting power from those with more power to those with less power within sexual and reproductive health and rights (SRHR)



Mission of the sub-committee: not just at ICFP, but between conferences, too


- Elevate and document persistent inequities in conducting SRHR research, program implementation, and policy advocacy

Shifting Power and Advancing Equity in Population Health Webinar Series: How does the history of population health impact our work today?

Hosted in partnership between the International Conference on Family Planning's Power Shifting Subcommittee and the Interdisciplinary Association for Population Health Science

NOVEMBER 2, 2023 11:00AM - 12:30PM EDT

The public health field has been engaging in efforts to better understand the historical power dynamics and shift power. Colonialism and its legacy are part of our shared human history. The social structures, funding models, and knowledge generation practices that define global health are rooted in a history of inequality, exploitation, and racism. For the population health community, this is also a history of coercion, population control,

and eugenics. Calls to address these legacies continue to fall short, challenging the community to think and act critically to address them. These actions hold the potential to bring historically marginalized individuals to the table as contributors and spur rich conversations about "decolonizing knowledge".

We aim to create interactive virtual spaces to explore the question: what can we do to shift power and advance equity in population health now?

In the first session we will start by discussing how this work is progressing currently and how we got here. We will first reflect on the historical legacies of family planning, population health, and development broadly and how they impact the systems that we are working within today.



51% from high income countries; 33% from low-income countries, 16% missing data






"What are the key questions the community is grappling with?" (n=1,247)

"What is your long term hope for power shifting and equity in global health?"




