- Cradle of Humankind!
- Home to 20% of world's population
- One in four people on the planet will be African by 2050
- Disease burden remains high
- Clinical research low, but increasing
- Collaborative research on the rise
- Few studies led by PIs from Africa

Introduction to Fieldworkers

- Research frontline staff
- Employed to support in consenting, data collection and participants' follow up
- Facilitate community entry or “giving back to the community”
- Explain complex studies in local language and maintain trust
- Their role RI remains understudied

Study Objectives

- Exploring fieldworkers' institutional support systems
 - **What institutional support systems, if any**
 - **How do they shape fieldworkers' RI practices**
 - **What roles do fieldworkers' play in promoting RI**

Methodology

Mixed qualitative methods approach

- **Sample:** Two large international research Institutions, and their fieldworkers purposively selected
- **Document review-**Existing policies, guidelines, frameworks
- **Key informant interviews-**Knowledge of in/formal support systems, procedures and processes
- **Individual In-depth interviews-**Knowledge of in/formal support systems, procedures and processes

Findings

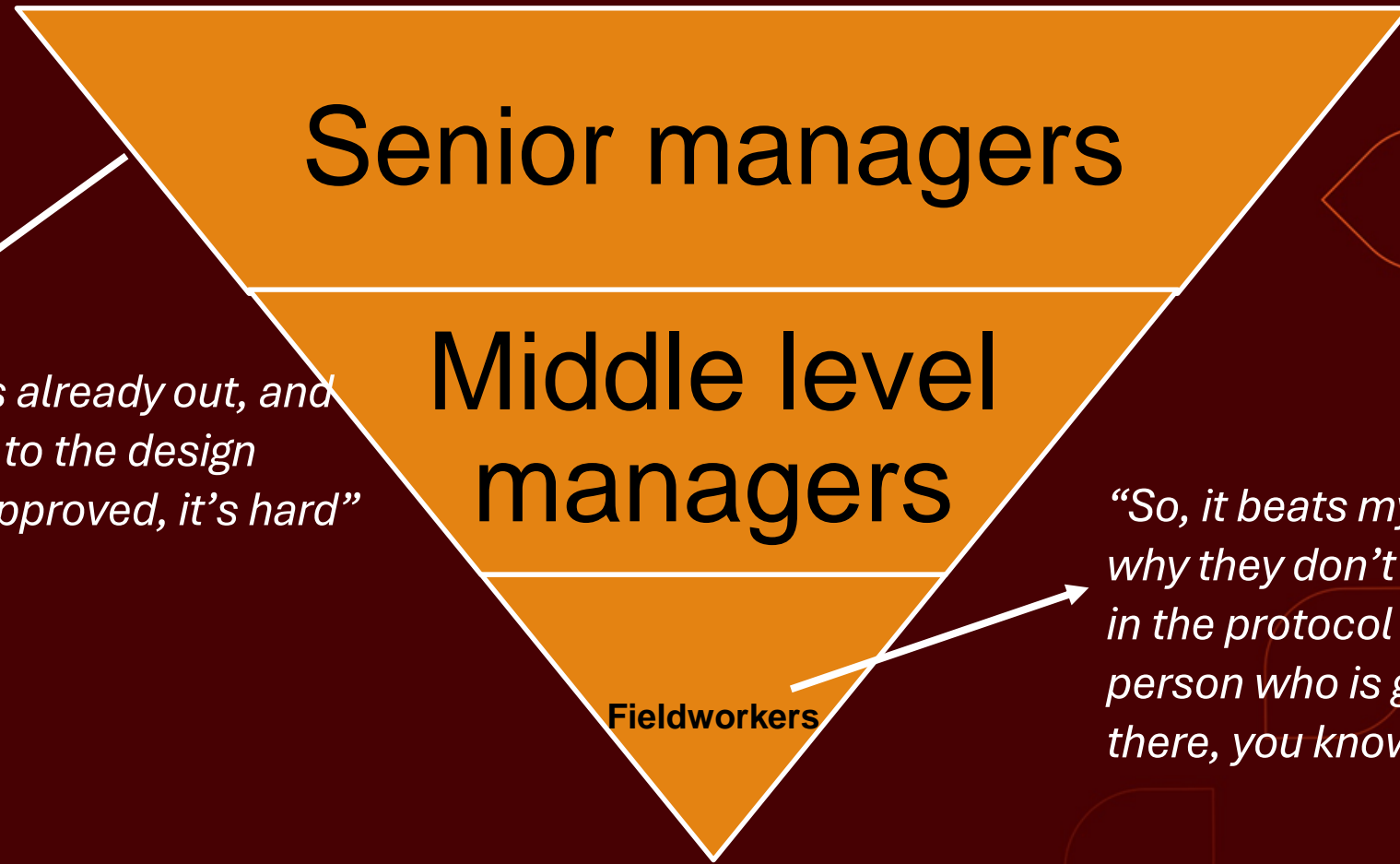

Different Processes, Different players..

- Research involves different stages and engagements
 - Conceptualisation, planning, implementation and dissemination
- Engagement of different players, at different stages
 - Scientific leader, PIs, senior researchers, researchers
 - Managers, coordinators, supervisors, MD, Cos, nurses,
 - Fieldworkers

...Conceptualisation and planning

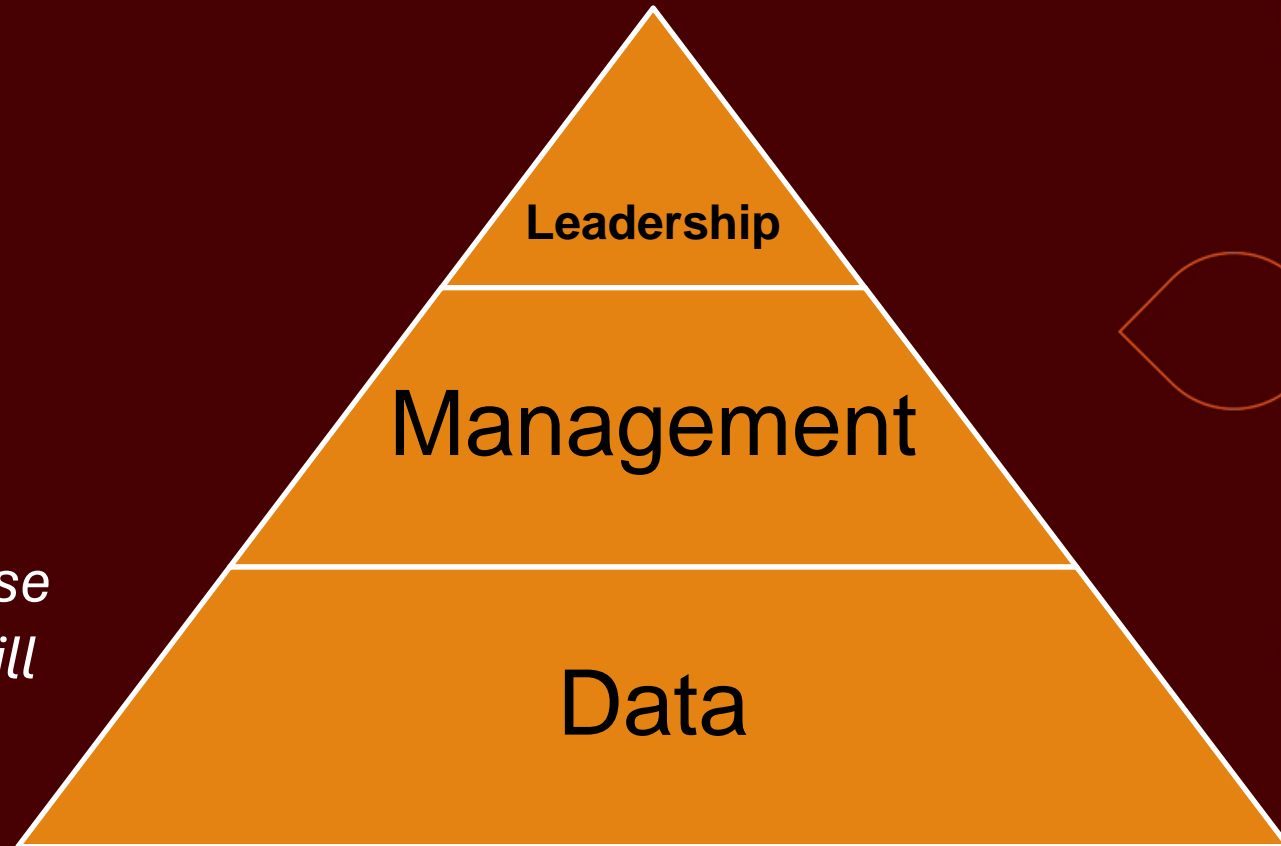


“Sometimes the design is already out, and they can’t make changes to the design because if a protocol is approved, it’s hard”

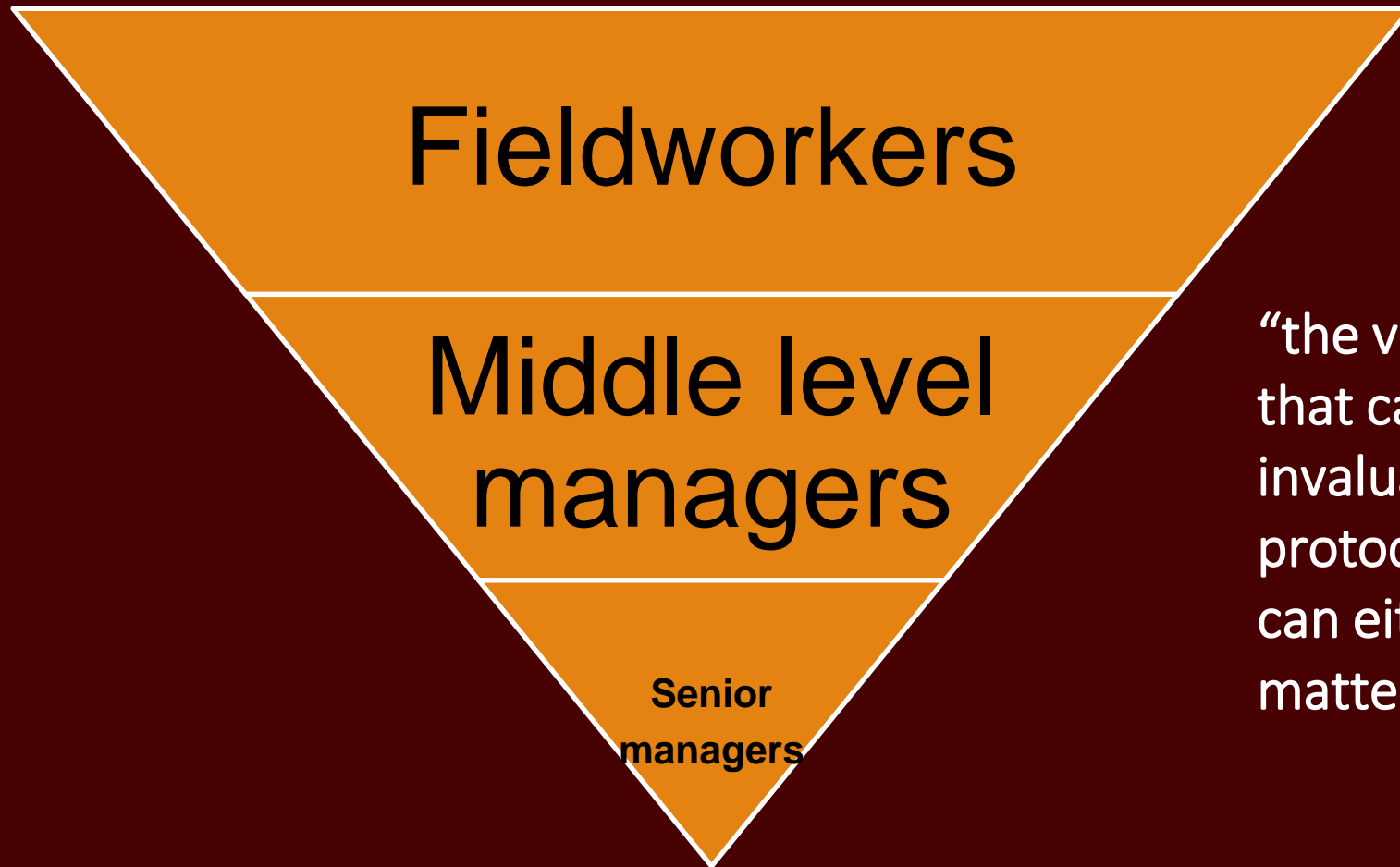
Different inputs, different value

...Data collection

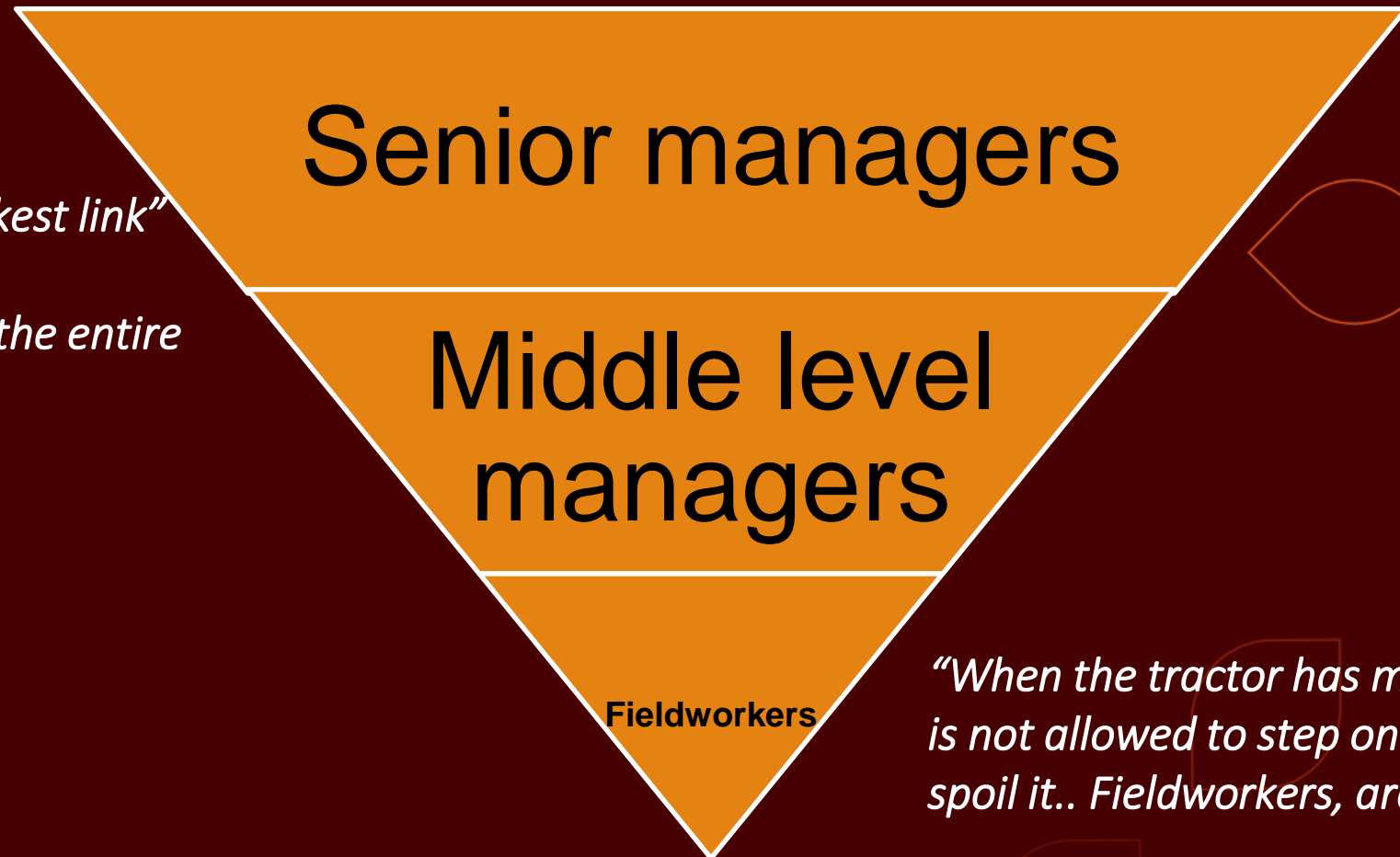

Conclusion

- Fieldworkers perceived to play a critical role
- Inverse relationship between perceived value of research data, data collectors and institutional support
- Implication for fieldworkers' morale and practice?
- **Implication for institutional vision for excellence?**
- Enabling environment for research excellence?...*we are as strong as our weakest link..*
