- Establishing a research culture with respect and understanding for cultural differences between countries, academic disciplines, research groups and individual researchers/personalities.
- Compulsory beginner and advanced courses in RE/RI.
- Correct interpretation and implementation of the Vancouver Recommendations.
- Available updated templates for authorship contracts.
- A monitoring system for all on-going co-authorship contracts.

Communication is the key

Communicate early,

clearly, respectfully,

honestly and continually.

NREC encourages researchers to:

- Act with respect and understanding for cultural differences between countries, academic disciplines, research groups and individual researchers/personalities.
- Ensure honest and open communication from the start between all parties involved in the research project.

• What do you think the main reasons for co-authorship conflicts are?

- Discuss general expectations for various roles. •
- Achieve an early common understanding of the applicable principles of authorship, such as:
 - co-authorship qualifications 0
 - authorship order 0
 - acknowledgements and credits \bigcirc
 - updates when changes occur. \bigcirc
- Make sure the discussion results in a signed co-authorship contract.
- Revise the contract when needed.
