# Exploring the Impact of a Novel Virtual PrEP Care Model in Canada Among Gender and Sexual Minority Communities

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### Background

- Gender and sexual minority communities, at large, have less access to STBBI education, testing,
  and treatment
- Clinical settings will often expose LGBTQ2S+1 people to stigma, sex negativity, and outdated views on STBBIs, including prevention
- In Canada, HIV PrEP has not been accessed widespread among gender and sexual minority populations, as well as other communities at higher HIV risk
- Although PrEP use has increased, it remains far below guidelines recommendations in Ontario,
  Canada's province with biggest PrEP uptake<sup>2</sup>

#### Freddie PrEP Model



#### **Easy and Convenient**

Simple and streamlined risk assessment form and consultation scheduling

PrEP delivered to door or pharmacy of choice







Affirming providers with training on LGBTQ2S+ health; PrEP

Providers understand PrEP considerations for different

communities

#### Accessible



Financial assistance programs allow over 90% of Freddie patients to pay zero dollars for PrEP

Care coordinators provide one-on-one support through lab testing reminders, individualized care



#### Discussion

- Over 1,500 patients served from June Dec 2020 (32.3  $\pm$  9.5 years)
- 91% are new PrEP patients having never taken PrEP before
- 6.6% of Freddie's patients do not identify as cis-gendered
- 77% of Freddie's PrEP prescriptions get renewed after 1-month follow-up
- 86% of Freddie's PrEP prescriptions get renewed after 3-month follow-up



#### **Conclusions**

- There is a **high proportion of PrEP initiations** in Freddie's novel PrEP service model
- Over 1,500 PrEP users were served in the initial 7 month period (June-Dec 2020)
- Similar proportion of non-cis-gendered patients; comparable to published literature (6.6% v 9.6%)\*
- Similar or higher rates of patient retention at initial (77% vs 77%)<sup>1</sup> and ongoing (86% vs 77%)<sup>2</sup> follow-up visits, compared to published literature

## An accessible and affirming virtual care model can rapidly scale up and provide care to sexual and gender minority groups

Additional facilitators and barriers to care access and patient retention will need to be explored through patient-specific feedback and through acquisition of additional data
